Words from the Boss:

I'm not sure where the year has gone, but the months are hurtling past like Millie Holmes on her way to her next court appearance. The events are also going past at the same rate of knots.

We weren't able to run the Stewards Trophy motorkhana scheduled for the start of July, as there was just too much rain leading up to the event. Neil and I took a splash around the paddock on foot early that morning, and concluded that there'd be a lot of cars mostly sitting still and throwing mud backwards. Also that we'd probably start sinking vehicles in the boggy bit between the paddocks.

In the interests of having more than a one event trophy series again, we're going to try to reschedule the event for later in the year. I'd definitely recommend keeping an eye out for the event, as Neil has come up with some fun tests that will be a bit out of the usual.

I headed up to Levin at the end of June, to take some photos at Gladstone Road. It turned out to be an interesting corner, as Ernie Pink rolled his Corolla just around the corner from me. I heard him coming back towards me on the return portion of the sprint, then it all went very quiet, and there were crunching noises. I pointed the camera down the road and held the button down. Moments later, the Corolla rolled (literally) into view. It would seem that the nose caught the bank and did the climb and roll thing, snapping the steering rack joint in the process. Ernie was fairly un-phased by the experience, which is impressive considering that he had just rolled the car in the middle of a road with a two story drop straight down to a creek immediately beside him.

Alex Baker got a big understeer going in my direction, while Euan Beattie did a big oversteer in my direction. Despite the fact that I was hiding behind a very solid power pole, that still made for some nervous puckering.

Jeff Ward was driving with his usual 10000000% commitment, and I had a great view of him fighting the Legacy sideways down the entire length of a straight. That man clearly has barbed wire, concrete, and hard pills in his porridge. I've not spied results, but by all accounts he did win the event.

Poor old Victor put the final nail in the coffin of the silver Corolla as he understeered off the road and shortened it down to the size of a Starlet. This was of course a slight issue, as he was entered for Rally Wairarapa ... so a re-shell was required between June 21 and July 18! Somewhat of a big ask.

We've had the first running of the www.photoworks.co.nz Autocross Challenge, held up at Slipway in Brooklyn. In keeping with tradition, the weather on the day could be described only as 'frucking cold'. I've only been to one event up there that had temperatures that weren't in the low single figures, and that event wasn't one of them!

The scrutineers kept inspecting engines of cars, as that provided a means of defrosting hands, which was useful considering the scrutineering and documentation was being held up at the wind turbine car park. Where amusingly — it was so windy that they couldn't run the wind turbine.

To our great happiness 27 hardy souls (as compared to Hardy Boys, which is a series of mystery books, and a TV series) turned up to have skids (slithers?) around the track. We even had a huge turnout of helpers, which was great, considering they kept freezing to death during the day and had to be defrosted every hour or so.

Ben (man who owns Slipway) had been given free reign to design the course, and set up a lovely technical course with a particularly challenging connecting hairpins section. I was loving it in the Pulsar, because if you stuffed the hairpin section entry point up, then you dropped speed for the whole next section. I think I actually only got that section right once during the entire day, and that was in one of my slower runs!

With the wet track all day, it meant that even the standard Pulsar was having some quite serious issues getting the power down. I went out fairly hard at first using lots of second gear and wheel spin. But I ended up running wide all over the damn place, including nearly going backwards off the track (whilst on full throttle and full handbrake at the same time). It became apparent that 'less is more', so I buttoned off to get a lower entry speed into the corners, and hugged as close as I could to the tightest lines. That paid huge premiums, as I immediately dropped a couple of seconds off my previous times.

There's a post event write up elsewhere in the bulletin, so I won't dwell on the results.

There were some fun things going on all day, with Brian "Roadrat" discovering the rear engine spin button in the middle of a run, and looping right in front of Dave Wilce (who was armed with a video camera). According to Dave, Brian might have used some strong language at that stage. Luckily the gale force winds meant the microphone didn't pick up anything that might be unsuitable for younger viewers. Dave was only able to video a few cars at a time before his hands went blue. He mustn't be as tough as those camera guys who cover rugby games midwinter.

Neil Roots was driving the City like he stole it - as usual. There were Scandinavian flicks, left and right foot braking at the same time, tyre stacks being frightened, and more body roll than a sumo wrestler during an earthquake.

Dave reckons that the Charade needs more power, as when he went out in the passenger seat of the racing zebra (aka Webster's Starlet) it turns out that Webster actually needed to use the brakes during a run. Apparently this wasn't needed in the Charade.

Some new guys to the club put in really good drives, with Peter Tomlinson swapping the lead with AI for the entire event, eventually bringing the Mirage home in second place, and Sean Chia getting the final place in the top ten in his late model Civic.

There was a bit of competition in the "Fast Ladies" contest, with Chelles leading the way, followed by Cathy, Kylie, and Jilly. The last three of whom rhyme.

Loren will be a bit gutted as he put in a time that was the second fastest time recorded, but clipped a marker, so picking up a five second penalty. In fact the fastest two overall times recorded were actually both on runs where the driver hit a marker. Fairly unusual to see that in an autocross.

The next event on my schedule was Rally Wairarapa. Though obviously as I don't have a rally car, I was merely there armed with a camera, all the wet weather gear I owned, and a packed lunch.

We headed over on Sunday just for a day trip, and managed to spectate the entire field four times, which was pretty good going. Took about 500 decent photos between us, and went for a visit to the service park. There was probably the smallest HCCC turn out that I've ever seen at Wairarapa, and the only car/driver that I recognised as being HCCC was Vaughan Majendie in his VR4 (replacing the very faithful Subaru that he has rallied for many years). Apologies if you're HCCC and were entered in the rally and I didn't know it!

It was a stunner of a day, and all the wet weather gear stayed in the car. The roads were looking really nice, and even when we went through Bartons Line after the competitors had gone through it wasn't even terribly dug up.

Though, as usual, watching the rally made me desperately want to be out there doing it next year! Graeme and I hatched about 19 plans for ways to enter the rally, all of them were fairly improbable. At one stage we plotted that putting a cage into a big 4wd like a Landcruiser would be a good idea, as you could spend all day towing people back onto the road for 'donations'. Although you'd spend twice as long on the stage as any of the competing cars just because you'd be so slow!

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I have been meaning to write a few random words for Wheelspin for a while just to let other club members know what we get up to between the few meetings that we attend.

Don and I have had a fast car and track day habit for quite a while. We both have other 4 wheeled projects - mine being a Caterham 7 & a Rotax kart, and Don is building a LS6 engined TVR Cerbera.. However we didn't want to use either of the cars for full-on motorsport. At the end of '07 we cooked up a plan to do a joint purchase of a motorsport toy and set about searching TradeMe for something suitable. After rejecting quite a few impractical (but fun) options, we settled on a 1985 Porsche 944 targa car. It had had a long and reasonably successful motorsport career and came with a pile of spares and some good set up information.

We settled into a few easy events to get used to the car and find out how it went.. starting with a track day at Manfeild, a dual car sprint and then finally what we bought it for — Targa Rotorua '08. This went well until the cam belt let go Sat lunchtime on a touring section and bent 3 valves. We worked until 3am and managed to complete the second day of the event.



By this stage we were beginning to learn a little about the car - and how to fix it. More importantly we were learning how to set up the suspension to suit conditions and then how to use the grip to best advantage. As the car only has a 2.5L standard motor, we need to keep the corner speeds up if we are to be competitive.

The next event was the big scary 5 day Targa. This was a major adventure, not only for us, also for our girlfriends who acted as service crew. The event went really well until the afternoon of the 4th day when we did an inverted double flip parking manoeuvre in Pongaroa (yes it is on YouTube if you are feeling that sadistic)

So there we were at the end of '08 back to square one but with a hunger for more motorsport action.

After a bit of a think we stripped down the old car and sold the shell for scrap (is \$16.80 for a Porsche some kind of a record?). We then bought another road car and stripped that down before starting the long rebuild. Jan & Feb were sacrificed to the garage and our first outing was Targa Bambina in March. The car understeered more than was ideal, but we picked up 3rd in class. Back to the garage for the installation of a bit more negative camber and then out again for the Taranaki tarmac rally in May. This was a bit off a change of pace, with 'proper' rally timing instead of the relaxed Targa version and lots of stage miles packed in from dawn to dusk. The roads were also different to Targa, with some very tight, twisty and slippery stages in the morning. We also opted to run without pace notes as we were treating this as a shakedown event and we don't get to use them for Targa.

The event was a success in that nothing broke, the car's handling was good, we didn't do any unscheduled parking and we enjoyed the day... which after all is what it all about. The attached photo is from Taranaki showing our method of trying to save the tyres (failed)


Next event was Targa Rotorua, which threw everything at us... rain, hail, thunderstorms, fog, plague of magpies (they lost) and gravel. lots of gravel. Great fun but a bit sphincter tightening at times. We opted for a safe level of attack and a finish, but not a glorious one.

But fun was had by all and we learnt a bit more about car set up (like it is important to get it right if you want your tyres to last the event... oops!). The biggest problem however was a new kid on the block... the BMW E30 M3. This had just fallen into our class and was a problem — a big problem. They took the first 3 places in class, even with penalties applied for other indiscretions. So we now have to work out of we want to drop into the next age class and hide from them for a few years... or step up to the mark and find a 3 Litre motor - and probably a few brave pills.

Future plans include the odd rallysprint and then the Targa in October. This is now a 6 day event with almost 1000km of special stages - this doesn't include the prologue day. Getting through this will be quite a challenge for both us and the car - I can't wait.

Now you know who we are come and say Hi if you see us on an event.. thought we can probably do without the traditional 'moonrise' salute!


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HUTT VALLEY CLUB NIGHT

It was an excellent day in Wellington, if you were either a penguin, or a polar bear. There were four seasons worth of weather, assuming your seasons were rain, sleet, hail, and drizzle. All accompanied by a Southerly zephyr that reminded you why Brooklyn is such a great area for wind turbines to earn their keep.

27 keen drivers made their way to the Slipway venue, where an extremely technical track awaited them. Some fast S sections, a sweeper, and a series of handbrake corners that would make the Monte Carlo Rally very jealous.

Seven runs later, past National Autocross Champion Al Groves (Harbour Capital Car Club) lead the field home in his Sti Coupe, half a second behind him in a Mivec Mirage was Peter Tomlinson (in only his second event with Harbour Capital Car Club). Loren Brookes in another Sti missed out on second place collecting a time penalty on a run that would otherwise have seen him at the pointy end of the field.

I highly unlikely vehicle for the very tight course rounded out the final spot on the podium with Viv Eden competing in his road car, which is a Subaru Legacy station wagon. Get the groceries and run at the front of a competition event, apparently it is possible!

Third through eighth positions were separated by only a fraction over half a second, Webster Gough (HCCC) with the Starlet Turbo in fourth, Geoff Warren (HVMC) in an RS Legacy fifth, Pete Collins (HCCC) in his FXGT sixth, Leon Cast (HCCC) in a Pulsar Gti seventh, and Sam Duncan eighth in another Sti Coupe.

Some drivers and results worth mentioning are Peter Tomlinson in second overall, is a newbie to the Wellington club racing scene. Sam Duncan in eighth was running in his debut event. Sean Chia is a newcomer having come over from a Drift and Drag background to bring his Civic home in tenth. It is great to see new guys arriving on the scene and getting such great results.

The series Sponsor Chelles Roberts (HCCC) entered the round in her road car, with her race car being out of action. Her Corolla developed so much lean that it was nickname the Corroll-over, but even in a very standard Corolla she was the fastest lady on the day. Cathy Reid (HVMC) brought home her Charade two places ahead of her husband Mike. Brian Worboys drove the "Roadrat" special all day, despite downpours and hail. An achievement considering there isn't a hint of a roof on his homebuilt special.

The marshals were all frozen to their fire extinguishers and flags by the end of the day. But they're a hardy lot, and most of them were able to be brought back to live eventually.

The second round of the Photoworks Autocross Challenge is on August 30th.
