## The Fireman's Arms Jackson Street, Petone

Wednesday the 6th July 2012 @7:30



I haven't actually even had the car out of the garage since the last time I wrote, so there really isn't a lot for me to report on! However, there's a ton of events that I am looking forward to. Kind of strange for utterly the middle of winter, but hey, make skids while the rain falls I guess?

The only event I had on my personal calendar was a Motorkhana and Autocross the HVMC was due to hold at Silverstream, however the weather had other ideas in mind, and it was called off several days in advance. That paddock doesn't drain at all well, and we've had a few mud bog events there. They're not nearly as much fun as you'd think, as it gets and stays so wet that you actually can't get any speed up at all. Plus all the rear wheel drive cars get utterly stuck, and do about ten minute laps when they aren't stuck.

I headed out on a cruise ship out of Brisbane for a week, and went to a couple of Islands. You'll be pleased to know that even the island of Lifou (population not very many at all) has at least one boy racer, with faded out ripped tints and a loud car stereo. Port Villa has a pretty casual attitude towards anything car related. No speed limit, not much in the way of lane markings, pretty much pick your own speed and just overtake anything in your way. Also it would seem that duct tape is considered to be a structural repair there, and there's really not much point in repairing cars, judging from various cars with bits hanging off them. I think vehicle safety isn't really a major selling point either, as I saw a relatively new taxi with a completely rusted out sill running ¾ the entire length of the car.



The amount of events coming up is pretty awesome though, July 1<sup>st</sup> there's another Kapiti autocross. With the improved track layout it seems a bit safer on the machinery these days, because there aren't many tyre stacks beside the track. Those tyre stacks always added to the element of rolling the car level of risk. I'm not sure if they've done any rolling recently, but the last time I was up there, the course was pretty well covered in the loose gravel. So ground clearance a lot better than my Corolla would have been a good idea, as I was getting a bit slowed down by the amount of my sump guard that was in contact with the ground!

Saturday July 14<sup>th</sup> sees the Daybreaker run again in the Manwatu. This is a really good event to spectate and take photos at in my opinion. It's not all that much of a drive up to Feilding, and the event starts relatively late in the day (by rally standards) so it doesn't even require that much of an early start.

There will be a bit of a HCCC contingent up there for the event. Brian and I are giving it a go again in his Corolla, and Brendon (Chuckie) and Andrew are dusting off the black FXGT as well. Although they're returning to their usual roles of B1 in the driver side of the car.

I gather from doing a bit of reading, that there are less long stages in the rally this year, and they aren't running the same event as the last couple of years.

Just over a week later on the 22<sup>nd</sup> Levin is running my favourite sealed sprint of the year, Kaihinau Road (just North of Shannon, towards Massey). I can't rave enough about this event, it's a nice slippery narrow road, with lots of things really close to it that you can drive into, bits of the road are inclined to stay damp and scary. It's just awesome fun! Although because I'm a useless slack bastard, I haven't done the gearbox upgrade in my Corolla yet, so that straight is going to be driving me mad all day as the C52 Corolla gearboxes have about a five minute gap between the second and third gear ratio's. So you run it all the way to the rev cut in second, grab third, and the damn thing just about goes back to an idle again! Hopefully too, Neil can get me another couple of semi's, or I shall be running that day on decidedly average road tyres...

For those of you who recall, the day of Kaihinau Road last year, it snowed in Wellington. Wonder if that's going to happen again?

I don't know if it's 100% confirmed yet, but HVMC has a new sealed autocross venue (apparently at or near where the old GM autocross events used to be?), and they have an event scheduled for July 29<sup>th</sup>. Sealed events are always good where we can get them in Winter, as unless it floods (like Port Road did) then they're a moderately weather resistant event.

Another week after that, Taupo Classic Rally is running their sealed rally at the Taupo track. Andrew and I are heading up to compete there, in Andrew's blue Corolla. I decided that after the Manfeild round, that my car really is just way too slow for track stuff these days, and it wears stuff out a lot (like brakes and tyres!). So I'll be the ballast for Andrew instead. Hopefully I have better luck keeping my lunch in place than Brendon did at Manfeild. Although with the Corolla likely to be running slicks that day, the g-forces are going to be way higher than my usual gravel rides! Fingers crossed, and a very light lunch planned for that day.

So for those of you keeping track, it looks like I've got one weekend at home for the next month! We're not due to hear anything further about progress of the Slipway/Council vs Zealandia until late in July at the earliest. Zealandia is still continuing to hold up progress every step of the way.

That's all from me. See you on a corner somewhere most likely




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## 14 July 2012

At the half way point in the New Zealand rally season it looks likely that the Daybreaker Rally could prove pivotal in two major rally series. Certainly the results so far this year have left both the Central Region Rally Series and the Rally Xtreme Challenge wide open, with no clear leaders in the points chase.

The Total Lubricants Rally Xtreme Challenge is currently a battle between 4WD and 2WD, with only 6 points between Graham Featherstone (Lancer Evo 7) and Craig Stevens (Escort Mk II). Then it is very tight through the rest of the field with only one or two points separating most places. Encouragingly though, all of the classes are represented in the top 6, meaning that you don't need the flashest machinery and a big budget to be able to win the Challenge.

Over in the Geartech Central Region Rally Series it is even more interesting, with four points separating the top 4, and the top 5 are all 2WD cars. Tony McConachy in his Hyabusa powered Starlet leads by 1 point from defending CRRS champ Paul Black in his Corolla. Equal with Black is the surprise package of the season as Paul de Rose has peddled his Mirage to very good results, while the classic 2WD Lancer of Jason Timmins is 4th. The first 4WD car is driven by Quentin Palmer, who is in 6th overall.

With the points so tight, the Daybreaker Rally is set to be crucial. Especially as this is the last opportunity to score points for both series at the one event. Meaning that the 122km of competitive stages, over the winding gravel roads north and east of Feilding, will be the focus of some intense competition on Saturday 14th July.

Universally liked by the competitors, the roads provide a highly enjoyable challenge as a standalone rally. So when this is combined with the points scoring opportunities in two major series it is expected that a good field of drivers and cars will be revved up for the event. However competitors need to act fast if they are to secure their entry. Normal entries close on Wednesday 27th June 2012, after that late entries may be accepted, but will incur additional fees. 


