I'm still kind of building up to gravel season, which means a disappointing lack of me being out there doing skids.

My first scheduled green light of the season isn't until March 29th, and Wairarapa Car Club's Puketiro Road. It isn't a bit of road that I've managed to get me head around yet, as it has only run a couple of times since I've been doing gravel. Each time I've done the event, I've been wayyyyy down the results, and cursed myself for being such a chicken throughout the course. My suspicion is that there are a few corners that I really ought to be attempting in third gear, that in fact I'm coming down with acute cowardice, and losing about 10-20km/h in several places.

Rather to my disappointment (and entirely self-inflicted) is that Mangahao Dam, my favourite bit of gravel, is again happening on the same weekend as Rally Otago. Rally Otago being an event that I've already booked flights & accommodation for immediately upon the announcement of the date.

This does slightly put a crimp in my chances of getting a decent result in the WMSA series, however that's the way it goes when I put spectating ahead of competing!

On the car front, having offloaded the Leaf and the 86 in January, I've been rolling around in the mighty Toyota Schitz, meaning only one car in the driveway (and one in the garage, lurking, with no WOF). I have to say, I've actually enjoyed only having one expensive metal headache to worry about.

But all good things have to come to an end, and I've picked up a Kia Sorento diesel, to use as a tow wagon, and also daily driver.

Though it won't be anything like as fun as the Schitz, it will be rather more comfortable, and vastly more sensible. In fact, I'm tending toward calling it "the mum bus".

My neighbour who has spoken of digging out some of my bank, thus allowing me trailer space, hasn't progressed beyond the talking point. So I will investigate the tow dolly option, since I can actually store one of those at my house, without earthworks. Clearly it won't be as great as a trailer, but will be at least a step in the right direction, and one that isn't going to cost me hundreds of thousands of dollars of buying a new house.

I did look at about 1000 other vehicle options, but the diesel turbo thing ticked sufficient boxes. There was a Lexus/Harrier hybrid that looked like it would be a really nice daily driver, but

being CVT was going to be a bit marginal on the towing capability front. I borrowed an Outlander plug in hybrid for a weekend, but it had a lot of clever things, executed very poorly. Variable regenerative braking, that reset to the default setting constantly, lane departure warning that you had to switch off every single time you started the car, ditto the settings on the radar cruise control. It would have been a cheap to run daily (because electric), but the buy price was north of \$20k, and it felt like a bit of a bus to drive.

I even drove a Corolla GT lift-back, the same (but different) as my race car. But I decided that really, I should look at going the tow vehicle route.

But of course, me being me, this is highly unlikely to be my final word on the subject.

I've managed to get to some motorsport spectating in though, despite a lack of driving.

Brian Craig and I headed up to Kaihinau Road for the day.

I helped a bit at the scrutineering, and then cruised on in to the road with a camera.

Unfortunately for my continued ability to have functioning brain cells, it was 28c, and I was dressed for about 15c max.

There were some really good angles to be had, and I caught a lot of cars lifting either front or rear wheels through corners, before I gave up and hid inside a very well air-conditioned Kia, and cruised on home.

Hayden had some issues with a loose hub bolt, but was able to sort that, and carry on.

Ian Hendra did a big lock up, and chucked it into the scenery at the end of the big long straight. Which must have been a rather scary ride.

However, they did get the car straight again for Wallaceville Hill the following weekend (which is actually running while I'm typing this up).

Jeff Ward crossed the finish line backwards to win the event in the "Hillman Hunter" (featuring about 3% actual Hillman) to win Kaihinau road. Which isn't quite as epic as winning the event flying through the finish line upside down, but is still quite a stylish way to do it. Unfortunately it resulted in an off road excursion, and that first timed run was it for the day so far as I know.

I haven't seen any results out for Wally Hill at this point, but I am gathering from a photo from Webster, that he has been doing a little bit of earthmoving in the Starlet. But it doesn't appear to be too horrible, so should be okay again for Mt Vic.

Since we're doing segues from event to event, Wellington Car Club has advised that Mt Vic is full, and now have started a waitlist. Looks like having Hayden Paddon coming to compete has taken it from a popular event, to a sell-out event.

They're very very likely to be looking for some crowd control marshals. So if you're okay dealing with members of the public who love to ignore whole forests worth of "Closed" signs, without losing your cool, get hold of Jody or one of the other WCC committee.

The 2020 motorsport calendar is well underway. Torrential rain resulted in the Dubai 24 hour being red flagged. For anyone wanting to free stream the recent Dakota 24-hour event, no joy. IMSA TV broadcasts were blocked in NZ, I'm assuming in favour of one of the 'pay to view' options. Boo and hiss! As I write this, I'm up to hour 18 of the event. My first attended event for the year was the Bathurst 12 hour. Based on what I considered was a poor Saturday programme in 2019, I chose to attend only on the Sunday. Taking a leisurely approach, the trip to my accommodation was punctuated by a refreshing swim at Kiama. And boy was that ever need. The mercury topped 45 Celsius. By the time I arrived at my accommodation I was hot, tired and generally buggered. A cooling shower was essential and liquids – a one and a quarter litre of tonic [with minimal gin] that seemed to evaporate as soon as it was consumed.

Having travelled through such heat the decision not to be at Bathurst seemed a good one. However the excessive heat did have a consequence. My intended 4am to departure for Bathurst the next morning did not happen. The previous day's drive had taken more out of me than I'd expected. So I opted to watch the first hour and a bit live on TV. While it lacked the atmosphere, it did have the benefits of being more comfortable and cooler. And I was able to complete a work job as well. It meant I drove over to Bathurst in full daylight and a much-reduced likelihood of meeting the local wildlife. I won't say much about the race itself. It's an event I enjoy because of the variety of cars and the strategies adopted. Even though the trophies were awarded on the day, there was a subsequent change to the finishing order because of a pitlane infringement.

The Bathurst 12 hour is run under the auspices of Supercars. The 39-car entry was down on the 55-car high in 2017. And a number of these never made the start line due to significant crashes during practice. Supercars 2020 has 23 entries and that's the lowest number for some time. So it does make you wonder whether the Supercars organisation has lost the plot or we're seeing a very sick series limping on beyond its use by date. Discuss at your leisure.

As the race ended rain started to fall. While the spots were large there was no indication that it was any more than a passing shower, soon to evaporate. I headed back to my accommodation taking the Mandurama Road [read my November 2018 article for previous adventures on this road]. There was the odd wet spot and you could see where water had flushed the plastic litter from road side drains. Not much further and progress was halted by a road stoppage. I was directed back to the Great Western Highway. I'd gone a few kilometres when I came across debris over the road. Flood waters had run over the top of a culvert bringing logs and other debris on to the highway. Police and council workers were guiding drivers through the mess. And when I say logs, they were logs. I found my way to an alternative route where the runoff from paddocks had left a slippery sludge across the road. Mostly dead grass and leaves. What had been empty rivulets in the morning were now raging torrents of angry, black waters. Given their ferocity you could not be certain they'd not swamp the road again, so I did not stop for pictures. Where I was

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staying had received 4mm of rain whereas the Cowra region had something like 100mm. The rain was accompanied by whipping winds bringing down more branches from drought damaged trees. For this trip I hired a car out of Sydney airport, and went cheap. A Kia Rio with almost 10,000 k's

on the clock. A vehicle that's probably fine in city environs. But with 1.4 litres and a 4-speed auto, less than highway motoring. Any sign of a hill and it slowed dramatically. The tiptronic appeared useless. The only make it go was to floor the throttle, wait for the change and then flick into tiptronic mode. Up to 2,500 rpm it was sluggish – very much a Nana car. But get it above this to 3,000 rpm and you were soon zipping along at 120kph. first day I noticed direct sunlight on the acre of plastic



reflected badly in the windscreen. So another Kia I wouldn't rush out to buy. Oh heck I have another booked for Adelaide. My justification is it's cheap and I'll only be nana-ing around town. After the 12 hour I spent a day in the Orange area. I found some nice wineries and purchased the prerequisite six bottles to transport home in the suitcase. In taking something of a back road to a winery I also picked up a puncture. While I sampled the local vintages staff in the winery changed the wheel for me. Such service, and the wines were pretty good too. So do try Printhie Wines if you're over that way. A sedate drive at 80 kph got me to Orange where I found a tyre shop. The tyre had a stick through the sidewall. Expecting to purchase a new tyre, I returned 90 minutes later to find it repaired at a cost of AUD29. I very much doubt the tyre would have been repaired in NZ. The next day I ventured over to the east coast to stay near Nowra. My original booking at Batemans Bay was cancelled as the owners had taken in bush fire refugees. More on that later. The drive along Kangaroo Valley Road was enjoyable, although some of the grades were a struggle for the Rio. But really some time for swimming and relaxation. I did journey down to Batemans Bay. While I swam in the lagoon at Mossy Point, the water contained ash and other fire debris. The area to absolutely stun me was Mogo, about 10 kms south. This is settlement with several small businesses. Fire appeared to come along a gully, up a slope and jumped the road. It destroyed almost everything at the northern end, yet the southern end of the settlement was mostly untouched. From there the fire had roared up a hillside and over the top. Down the other side you could see where fire had cut a swathe through the bush and near the roadside a burnt out Landcruiser sat surrounded by a luxurious growth of grass. And this was the amazing thing. Grasses were recolonising and regrowth was evident on some trees. While I don't have an image of it, I was struck by one vista where fire had turned the area into what I'd describe as a moon scape. Except for all these burnt sticks pointing skywards where once there had been trees. So a difficult experience to adequately explain in terms everyone can understand. And if you look at the image of the Rio above there is a bus shelter in the background. This appeared completely untouched by the inferno. Tradies vans abounded as infrastructure is restored. While road surfaces appeared intact, there was a toll on safety barriers and signage. Some signs are little

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more than blackened surfaces while many Armco barriers need replacing, especially the buffer end sections.



Subsequently upon my return NSW has suffered severe wet weather. What was dust and fire one week, was mud and boiling water the next. How quickly things change.
