Actually, I wonder how many words I've written over the last perhaps 30 years of doing a monthly column for a car magazine? I'm guessing quite a few. I really should go digging back through some 1990's magazines and work out when I first started... Plus, I wonder how hilariously nonsense things I

wrote back in the day, that I totally don't agree with, or relate to now?

We've got a lot of events coming up between now and September. So keep a watch out for details on the Facebook page.

Autocross events August 18th, and September 29th. Both are in Masterton on the seal (arf arf). By the time this magazine comes out, the 23rd June Autocross will have already run. So it's going to be all three events of this trilogy scheduled as being on Tarmac. We'll look at running on grass again in Spring or Summer.

Thanks as ever to Neil Roots / Neil's Wheels for sponsoring these events. Not to mention scrutineering, and marshalling!

Talking of marshalling, apologies to Brendon for missing him off the marshals thank you list from my last article.

On the social side of things, we've got a daytime movie showing of the movie Poppy, out at GNS. We've aimed for an early start, and a family friendly movie, so that those with smaller human beings in their household can come along. Reminder that because it's a private theatre inside a business, it's a non snacks theatre. So put that in your calendar for about 2pm on July 6th (refer to the Facebook event).

Then socially, in August, we're looking at Go Karts at Porirua, fourth Tuesday of August (August 22nd). Time to be advised, again, keep a watch on the Facebook page. Probably in the region of 7pm.

Other people's events that could be a bit of fun, Taranaki Tarmac rally is running July 7th under dual permits, depending on if you want to do the short Clubman's rally, or the full fat National permit variety. Levin Car Club will be running Wairongomai Road gravel sprint up at Otaki, on July 21st. Triumph (and friends) are running their next round of the Surgery Intermarque Sprints on July 28th. Also in July, Manawatu is running their single/dual sprints on July 14th, and 24 Minutes of Le Manfeild (don't ask me... it's their name!) on July 20th & 21st if you don't fancy the gravel event on the 21st.

The long suffering Corolla Notion is in with John getting engine swap surgery, with the (standard) rebuilt engine finally being fitted. I'd hoped to get to the engine in prior to Daybreaker Rally last year. But with the very long rebuild time, that clearly didn't happen. Then it has taken a while for there to be a spare hoist at John's work.

There's a few other tasks being done at the same time, with different springs going into the back along with replacement shocks. Hopefully the replacement rear springs are a touch softer than the current Celica units, however the only way I will find out is to drive it. Plus the Whiteline front swaybar is finally coming out, having been fouling the front tyres on full lock for at least the last decade. So either that bar was never for an AE92, or Whiteline's quality control has some questions to answer.

There's a bit of a smoking crater where my Visa card used to be, but I can't get too grumpy about it, given that the current engine has been in there 8 years now, and has been burning oil the entire 8 years. She still hasn't blown up as such, but there's definitely some solid (chunky) evidence of dirt having bypassed the air filter, and having been breathed in. So I'll just quietly stash that engine under the house and pretend that I've not seen anything (until I need to get it rebuilt anyway). It is looking like John has managed to make an AE101 airbox fit in the AE92 enginebay, so hopefully the filter issue is addressed.

The goal is hopefully to get the car back and run in, in time for Wairongomai Road. The current

state of my bank balance suggests that it will be a stretch to get the car to Daybreaker 2024 though.

As to the events I've managed to get to since last month's marathon efforts, I've been to Manfeild twice. Once for the Surgery Sprint round in June, armed with a clipboard to do official things, and once to drive the Swift at the Manfeild 4.5km full track sprint.

The Surgery day went pretty smoothly from the officials point of view, some spins, but nothing

in the way of car vs anything else contacts that I'm aware of.



Shane's Golf did rather nervously return to the pits with what he described as being "a lot of warning lights on the dash", but he wasn't forthcoming with information beyond that. Possibly because of my ruthless pisstaking of him before the start. Although it might just be a co-incidence (it isn't a co-incidence).

Dick Butters had a good day circulating in the Mirage, he really does seem to be enjoying that car a lot, which is excellent to see. Son Kerry on Chauffeur / Tow Car driver duties for the day.

There were some interesting engine mismatch vehicles running on the day too. A Fiat 124 Sport, running a rotary. A very very pretty yellow Lotus replica, running a Honda. A BMW E30, running a Toyota V8 Then also what I thought was a Vauxhall Firenza (Viva with a V8 bunged in it), but actually turned out to be a Chevrolet Can Am, an obscure South African market car.

The day ran smoothly, and I think some people had actually done their official timed runs by

lunch break. Which is not a bad achievement. They ran out of cars on the grid by 3pm, so I even got to hit the road home pretty early.



I took the Rav up there, and it really is a nice comfy solution to long drives, which is quite pleasing. It has taken me since January to actually get a decent length of drive in it, which is pretty funny given that I think within a week or so of owning it, Geoff and Sarah borrowed it to go to Rotorua and back. There's a lot to be said for radar cruise control, when you're driving on SH1. Really can set and forget, especially considering the amount of red and blue lights enforcement out there these days.



Having roasted the brake pads in the Swift at the first sealed autocross, I invested in some Japanese (not overnight freight) brake pads that might hold up under higher temps. She was letting some smoke out pretty well after a couple of back to back runs, and the pedal wasn't feeling very reassuring.

So having fitted some hotter grubbier pads, it seemed only right to take it up to Manfeild for a play. So I had a go at the 4.5km Manfeild sprint, which is the old track + the backtrack joined with a fairly gnarly chicane.

I had the extremely elderly semi slicks sold to me stupidly cheap by Dean Herd, and a fire extinguisher bracket courtesy of Webster. So it was race ready(ish).

Having arrived to the track, and chucked the other tyres on it, a bunch of race cars turned up. This suggested to me that I might have brought a rubber chicken to a gunfight.

It started out a bit damp and cold underfoot, so my first run of the day was hilariously loose, swapping understeer and oversteer throughout some of the quicker corners. The brakes were working pretty well once I'd cooked them a bit, as they hadn't really bedded in properly in just road use.

The tyres lived up to the expectations Dean set to me, which was "they might be okay in an autocross but don't use them on the racetrack". He wasn't kidding! Definitely substantially under tyred for racetrack stuff.

I've no idea where I am in the results, but I'd have to assume somewhere in the bottom quarter of the field!

There were some familiar looking faces and cars up there though, with Brent Sellens in the stickered up GR, Loren in the Sti, Nick Chong in

another GR, Lee Herd in the AE111, and Stephen Heise in the Falcon.



From the in car video footage, it would appear that Lee has sacrificed another gearbox on the



altar of speed, coasting to a halt after a mighty bang in his last run. Although he did win class. That's actually the only result I know from the day, as at the time of writing, we've not seen any results out.

I'll wrap this up here, and hopefully I might be able to supply some results for the next magazine!

MOTORSPORT ONLINE UPDATES

A series of updates were recently released to MotorSport Online. These updates are summarised below.

Email Notifications: An overhaul to the email notifications that are automatically generated by the platform was implemented. This will result in clearer email notifications for competitors, organisers, officials and administrators.

Licence Application Filter: A filter has been implemented to prevent competitors from applying for licences they already have or do not require (e.g. C Grade licence holder applying for an M Grade).

Prevent Duplicate Profiles: Improved measures to prevent existing users from creating duplicate profiles were introduced.

Hope June treated you well and, welcome to July's edition of the Wheelspin. This month I'm a little light on content as yours truly caught her first dose of COVID and has spent the


