Bit of a shorter article this time around, as I've not done any driving events since we last spoke, because the deadline for the December mag was quite early.

I'm still deciding if I do the November Rubber Duck (brought to you by Neil's Wheels) round or not, as I don't think I'll have a functional reliable oil pressure gauge in the car by then. With the oil pressure having spiked high a couple of times at the Akatarawa event, I'm

dubious about running while not trusting either or both of my oil pressure and gauge. With the oil pressure previously reading lower on the gauge than in the previous 20 years with this engine, and now spiking the gauge (or, maybe it's just the gauge spiking itself for no reason), it's undermining my confidence a bit.

Apparently stuck oil pressure relief valves can also be a thing. But also, I'm a non mechanic, so I've no clue if intermittent sticking pressure relief valves are a thing that can happen or not. I'll seek expert guidance between now and decision time.

Since the Aka event, the Corolla has I think done a sum total of two trips up and down my driveway.

Glad to report the Swift has been sold, and moved on to a new home after two months on the market. So that's going to allow Corolla strut rebuild funds to be allocated. I'm pleased with the new front springs getting me a bit more ground clearance at the front, so adding rebuilt shocks to that, should help control them a bit more nicely too (as per previous comments, the front shocks are nine years old).

Annoyingly, looks like some car funds will instead be going into hearing aids, as it turns out that I've lost quite a bit of hearing, especially from my drivers side ear (sorry, right ear). Seems that

hearing aids are really expensive.
Like more than a cheap car, and you
can spend as much as a good car on
them very easily if you wished to.
However it should assist in my extreme difficulty in being able to pick
out conversations from background
noise. Getting old is such fun ...

Port Road I was there in Steward mode, so I was armed with a folder of documents, and also my camera since I can stand on one corner, and get pics from four different angles.



The level of carnage was quite low, which is always helpful. There was an Evo rotation into a footpath (the classic Corner #1 lose that I've seen a few times over the years), and Eli Sillay encountering a footpath or kerb in the big BMW.

Some interesting results at the pointy end of the field, with a couple of really quick Evo's up from the South Island taking out both first and second overall, two seconds ahead of the usually all conquering Cross Cars.

Holding up the Herd honours was Jordan who put in a clean drive all day in the Swift. No mean feat given that the weather was changing all day, causing a mix of wet and dry runs.



Webster wasn't able to enter, with the new driveshafts failing to be completed before the weekend. Mike Hollis in the Celica powered MR-S put in one hell of a run to bring his car in fifth overall.

Graham was 12th in the Yaris, putting in a tidy drive, and not letting some very wet runs ruin his day.

Matt and Steve dual entered the V8 Ford Escort, which was a heck of a fast bit of machinery,

and I actually managed to snap a photo of the car up on two wheels on the bump when you hug the inside of turn one.

The battle of the Carvers was won by Quin, who came home a couple of places ahead of Vinnie.

Mike Duston was back for the first time in years, running a Mk2 Swift Sport in the 0-1300 class.





He chased the Cappuccino (660cc turbo) hard all day, and got within about half a second. So I'm guessing the Swift will be getting some mods for a return match.

Then today (as I write this) I was at the Shelly Bay Sprint, parked up on my usual Mussel Farm corner.

I learned today, that you don't listen to the stereo

Not helping them, was multiple event clashes, which will have nibbled away some people. MG Classic, and a double Hillclimb in Hawkes Bay, as well as the Port Road drags.
